- 3. W made H happy at the end of the P? Who made Hashem happy at the end of the parsha? פנחס:Answer
- 4. H did B D? How did Bilgam die? Answer: He was killed by a sword.

Key Words

The leader announces the key word. Everyone else shouts out words that are associated with that word. A point is earned for each answer listed in parenthesis. Or try the reverse!

- 1. **cow** (red, עגל הזהב, חוק)
- 2. donkey (sword, hit, מלאך)

Crazy Text

Can you decode this text and figure out the message?

In this week's פרשה, the Torah describes the process of the **Para Shkula** (Para Aduma). When a person became impure by touching a **lead** (dead) person, he would have to bring a **plow** (cow) as a קרבן.

A whole procedure would take place on the 3rd and **8th** (7th) day.

The animal had to be completely **white** (red). Even only two white pieces of **pair** (hair) would make it פסול.

Later on the Torah tells us the story of בלק who reached out to **Paroh** (Bilaam) to help him **purse** (curse) the בני ישראל. Balak saw how the בני ישראל won all the previous wars and was afraid.

Instead of cursing them, בני ישראל blessed the בלעם.

Story Stop

Ray Aryeh Levin successfully persuaded all the local Jewish shopkeepers to close their stores on Shabos-all except one. There was one man, one store owner, a fellow who refused to close his store. The owner was not very observant; he was not a religious man, and he didn't see the need to close his doors on Shabbat.

The store owner thought that he would lose too much business if his shop were closed on Friday night and all day Saturday. Even so, Rav Levin would often speak to the man and gently try to persuade him to change his mind.

They watched him as he walked toward that one shopkeeper's store. When Rav Levin entered the store, he wished the owner Shabbat Shalom. He then asked the owner, "Would you mind? Could I just have a seat in your store to sit and to rest a little bit?"

The store owner felt honored that the rabbi was there, and he brought over a little stool for the rabbi to sit on. Ray Levin sat on the little stool in the corner of the store as Shabbos was coming in. And as Shabbos services were being chanted in the Shul just a few blocks away, RavLevin remained, sitting on the little stool in the corner of the store.

Rav Levin watched as many, many people came into the store. They

bought food; they bought newspapers and cigarettes. After about an hour and a half, the Rav got up. He thanked the shopkeeper for giving him a place to sit and rest. Rav Levin wished the store owner Shabbat Shalom and left the store. The owner of the store could not understand what had just happened. The rabbi had missed services on Friday night!

The rabbi had been sitting in his store, a store that was open and doing business on Shabbos! What's more, this rabbi had sat on a little stool in the corner of the store for an hour and a half, and he hadn't said a thing! The store owner found the rabbi's behavior very strange. It bothered him. So, on Sunday morning, the store owner went to the rabbi's house. He knocked on the rabbi's door, and the rabbi invited the store owner into his home.

"Please explain to me what happened this past Friday night," the shopkeeper said.

And this is what the Tzaddik of Jerusalem told him: "You know that I have asked you to close your store on Shabbos; we have spoken about that many times.
